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I. OPENING CEREMONIES

Mayor Miyagishima called the meeting to order and asked for a moment of silence. Councillor Sorg led the Pledge of Allegiance.

Mayor Miyagishima and a representative from the Animal Services Center of the Mesilla Valley presented the Pet of the Week.

Mayor Miyagishima presented the Mayor's Citation for Community Service to Dino Ray Villiani for having the name he submitted selected as the winning name of the Aquatic Center's turtle mascot.

Councillor Sorg presented a Proclamation to Donna Hommer and declared May 2015 as National Community Action Month.

Councillor Sorg presented a Proclamation to the Organ Mountain Desert Peak Coalition and declared May 15 thru May 22, 2015 as Organ Mountains Desert Peaks Anniversary Week

1 **II. CONFLICT OF INTEREST INQUIRY BY MAYOR AS REQUIRED BY LCMC**

 6 Mayor Miyagishima asked if anyone had any conflicts with anything on the agenda?

7
 8 There were no conflicts of interest.

9

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12 **III. PUBLIC PARTICIPATION**

13

14 James Scott, Member of the Public said my wife painted a painting of the Organ Mountains and we
 15 want to present the Mayor with a copy of that print.

16

17 Jack Eckman, Member of the Public said there are two items that I think improvements are possible,
 18 which are that Las Cruces and Doña Ana County need more opportunities for jobs with higher
 19 salaries attached and that Las Cruces and Doña Ana County need increased behavioral health
 20 services.

21

22 Steve Fischmann, Member of the Public said I speaking on behalf of the Southwest Energy Alliance
 23 and we are not particularly happy with the El Paso Electric Rate Case. The most effective way to
 24 minimize future power costs is to reduce wasteful use and improve system efficiency.

25

26 Jack Soules, Member of the Public said I was introduced to one aspect of Las Cruces's water issues
 27 in September 1955 at my house on Colorado Avenue. In the face of serious concerns about climate
 28 change, we cannot afford to waste any water. We must learn to control evaporation.

29

30 Debra Medoff-Marks, Member of the Public and Executive Director of the Las Cruces Symphony
 31 Association asked the City to consider sponsorship of the Pops Under the Stars Outdoor Concert for
 32 the City of Las Cruces.

33

34 Lonnie Kline, Member of the Public said we have been planning this concert since last October.
 35 This is a way to reach out to the community and play music that would serve the under served. I
 36 hope that you can support this.

37

38 Maggie Fallen, Member of the Public said I represent the Las Cruces Tennis Players Association and
 39 there is a continuing need to revitalize the Lions Park Tennis Courts.

40

41 Steve Chavira, Member of Public said I want to thank the City for the interaction with the Las Cruces
 42 Homebuilders Association. I would like to ask if the update to the MUNIS system allows for a fully
 43 automated permit tracking and construction project management tracking that can be brought to the

1 front and we would like to be part of the process. It is important to shorten the time from permit to
2 final approval to get in the building.

3

4 Rico Gonzales, Member of the Public and Director of New Mexico External Affairs for El Paso
5 Electric said we are here to talk about the rate case we filed last week with the PRC. We are more
6 than happy to participate in a work session, anything that you need from us in terms of
7 communicating to your constituencies and to yourselves.

8

9 Jim Schichtl, Member of the Public and Director of Regulatory Affairs for El Paso Electric gave an
10 overhead presentation on the rate case.

11

12 Councillor Pedroza said I want to talk about how depreciation of facilities works into the rate case,
13 the equity of how you arrived at rates, the names of the classes for each rate, and why you think it's
14 an equitable distribution of the rates. I'd like to talk about the environment and what you do to
15 protect the environment. If someone could explain the difference to me between a public utility and
16 an investor owned utility? I would also like to know the difference between Texas and New Mexico.

17

18 Councillor Small said I want to compliment the phasing out of coal. How many households is this
19 targeted to reach over the life of these rates?

20

21 Jim Schichtl said the starting point is to get approval for a pilot program where we would issue an
22 RFP to potential vendors of software and systems that allow them or us to perform this demand
23 response primarily for air conditioning recycling response of refrigerated air.

24

25 Councillor Small asked why not go more aggressively toward a tiered rate structure?

26

27 Jim Schichtl said we do have a tiered rate structure for residential customers in New Mexico. What
28 a demand response program like this allows you to do is to target the reductions when you need the
29 demand and the metering requirements are lower.

30

31 Councillor Silva asked if the process is one where El Paso Electric comes up with a payment plan
32 and then allowed to respond to that or is it a discovery process where El Paso Electric made this
33 investment and would like to recover this investment and then the negotiations start at that point?

34

35 Jim Schichtl said the utility has the burden of proof to demonstrate that they need a rate increase and
36 so the filing package includes all of the evidence we think necessary to support what we're
37 requesting. The commission will then send out a procedural schedule to set dates and time frames
38 but then other parties can intervene on the case and becomes participants in the process.

39

40 Councillor Silva said I'm assuming it's proportionally split apart since you're serving Texas and
41 New Mexico.

42

1 Jim Schichtl said we allocate between the jurisdictions, the total amount of revenue we need to
2 recover is split between Texas and New Mexico on the basis of the services we provide.

3

4 Councillor Silva said in Texas you work through the City Council and in New Mexico you work
5 through the PRC.

6

7 Jim Schichtl said the City of El Paso has original jurisdiction so they become our primary regulator
8 for the City of El Paso so we take our rate case to the City of El Paso as our regulator first. We also
9 file our case at the PUC because we have a lot more service territory. So, in New Mexico we take
10 our proposal to the PRC and let them make the determination. The City can obviously be an
11 intervener but they're obviously not a regulatory authority in that system.

12

13 Mayor Miyagishima asked what percent does Las Cruces and Doña Ana County represent of the
14 whole picture of El Paso Electric?

15

16 Jim Schichtl said it's about 90,000 customers in New Mexico, which Las Cruces makes up a good
17 portion of or about 20% of electric usage, so one fifth of our total.

18

19 Mayor Miyagishima asked how do I explain to my residents how a 20% increase in rates can be
20 justified with all that profit the last five years?

21

22 Jim Schichtl said it's different across classes. The increase in our non-fuel based revenue is the 7.1%
23 increase. When we make a determination that we have to go in for a rate case, it's about recovering
24 all of our operating costs to provide service, measuring our return on equity, and raise capital.

25

26 Mayor Miyagishima asked what can the ratepayer do collectively so they wouldn't have to see any
27 increases?

28

29 Tom Shockley said we need to make sure our kilowatt hours grow faster than our demand. We're
30 looking at a program for individuals to find ways for energy efficiency in their homes.

15 Councillor Sorg Moved to Approve Council Bill No. 15-036; Ordinance No. 2755 and Councillor
16 Smith Seconded the motion.

19 Robert Kyle, Building Official gave an overhead presentation and said this is the culmination of a
20 private sector and City staff pilot project that started back in 2012. This Ordinance is to create a
21 category of signs called Consolidated Developer/Builder Identification Signs and these are signs that
22 could be placed on private properties outside of the boundary of the subdivision. The other sign
23 being proposed is Development Directional Signage. These are small signs that direct you to the
24 subdivision. This was approved as an amendment to the sign code by the Planning and Zoning
25 Commission.

26
27 Quint Lears, Member of the Public said this is important because those coming from out of town are
28 not being able to find the new home communities and the reason is lack of signage.

29
30 John Moscato, Applicant gave an overhead presentation and said I met with Mr. Garza and Mr.
31 Denmark on ways to help City policy be more business friendly. Signage was designated as a high
32 priority.

33
34 Councillor Smith said the presumed result is a reduction in signage clutter.

35
36 Robert Kyle said yes, that is our hope.

37
38 Councillor Smith said length of sign placement is helpful.

39
40 Robert Kyle said there is an initial permitting term and a renewal term.

41

1 Councillor Levatino said she wants to compliment the City and private sector working together. My
2 customers find it easier to identify which developments are there and it's also a safety issue.

3

4 Councillor Pedroza said the letter from Mr. Ortega seems to support that this is only for one
5 developer.

6

7 Robert Kyle said this is a sign code amendment, which is for everybody. There are provisions for
8 doing a PUD with deviations from the specific signage. The Ordinance itself is a general application
9 process.

10

11 Councillor Small asked is there any plan for other sign code revisions?

12

13 Robert Kyle said yes, the staff wants to go through the code and look at multiple revisions.

14

15 Councillor Small asked will this Ordinance lessen advertisement signage while allowing offsite
16 advertising?

17

18 Robert Kyle said we hope that it will.

19

20 Councillor Small asked will there be a mechanism to monitor and enforce clutter?

21

22 Robert Kyle said it would be part of the current enforcement action.

23

24 Councillor Small asked do you think there is adequate tools for enforcement?

25

26 Robert Kyle said that's a codes enforcement function but this will help address the issue.

27

28 Councillor Small asked can you explain the 10 acre minimum?

29

30 Robert Kyle said it was to establish some kind of control or threshold.

31

32 Eddie Binns, Member of the Public said this is a project that will effect Citywide development and
33 a broad industry benefit.

34

35 Paul Ortega, Member of the Public read a letter he wrote regarding his concerns with this issue.

36

37 Steve Chavira, Member of the Public said I am with the Home Builders Association and we are
38 behind this. Let's showcase what other people coming to town want to know about Las Cruces.

39

40 Councillor Small asked is there any other public right-of-way use for signs?

41

42 Robert Kyle said yard sale signs are not allowed in public right-of-way. There are several
43 exemptions for signs allowed in the public right-of-way.

2 Councillor Small asked is there any cost associated with that?
3
4 Robert Kyle said there's the permit fee, the cost to build the sign, and the cost to maintain the sign.
5
6 Councillor Levatino said if I heard correctly they are paying something besides the permit fees.
7
8 Robert Kyle said they will indemnify the City.
9
10 Councillor Smith asked what might be some of the other defining aspects of whether or not it is
11 appropriate to let a sign be in public space?
12
13 Robert Kyle said it would predominantly be a traffic safety standpoint.
14
15 Councillor Small asked what if any limitations exist on the directional signs in public right-of-way?
16
17 Robert Kyle said it's one sign per quarter mile, maximum of four signs per development.
18
19 Councillor Pedroza asked when should we review this to see how successful or unsuccessful it has
20 been?
21
22 Robert Kyle said until we implement it and see what the response and impact is, it's going to be hard
23 to answer that.
24
25 Councillor Pedroza asked what penalties are imposed for violations?
26
27 Rusty Babington, City Attorney said as a petty misdemeanor the max would be \$500 and 90 days
28 in jail. I would have to look at the signed ordinance to see what's imposed.
