23 Marcy Driggers, Utilities Attorney gave an overhead presentation.

24  
25 Grover Pettes, President of Mesa Development said we've been in business for 50 years delivering  
26 water. We agree with the condemnation.

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Eric Martin, Project Management Administrator gave an overhead presentation.

Mayor Pro-Tem Smith asked are two of the columns floating on air underneath the floor?

Eric Martin said most of them are floating or don't have any type of footing.

Mayor Pro-Tem Smith asked will the columns be restored to maintain that appearance?

Eric Martin said yes.

Councillor Levatino asked are we hoping to have the columns done by September?

Eric Martin said yes.

Councillor Levatino asked are the wood floors going to be finished?

Heather Pollard, President of the Amador Hotel Foundation said we are going to restore the floors but it will be after the columns are restored because we don't want construction to destroy the floors.

Councillor Levatino asked what are we looking at as a completion date when it will be available for events?

Heather Pollard said that's up to the City Council and City Manager. My dream is for it to be operational within five years.

Robert Garza said that vision can be attained. We will likely be able to put the building into use before the restoration is completed within the next year.

Mayor Miyagishima called for the roll on the Motion to Approve Resolution No. 16-195 and it was Unanimously Approved. 7-0.

5 Councillor Sorg Moved to Approve Resolution No. 16-196 and Councillor Eakman Seconded the  
6 motion.

7  
8  
9  
10 Tony Trevino, Civil Engineer Senior gave an overhead presentation.

11  
12 Councillor Pedroza asked how is the warning given?

13  
14 Tony Trevino said the alerts will go to the Office of Emergency Management.

15  
16 Councillor Pedroza asked is it not to the actual residents?

17  
18 Tony Trevino said no but the information is available through the County website.

19  
20 John Gwynne, Supervisor for the Flood Commission said the warnings go out to different entities  
21 depending on the amount of rain. Direct warnings to residents will come in the future as we get  
22 more data. I would be more than happy to demonstrate the system for you.

23  
24 Councillor Pedroza asked will this be tied in with the distribution of sandbags?

25  
26 John Gwynne said it’s separate. The sandbags at the fire department are set out before events  
27 happen.

28  
29 Councillor Pedroza asked how will the general public benefit from the plan?

30  
31 John Gwynne said this will help the City and County with your community rating system. We’ll be  
32 able to see the storms as they approach.

33  
34 Councillor Levatino said I’m confused because I thought this would be a warning system for those  
35 in a flood area.

36  
37 Tony Trevino said this provides a baseline so that when we get a certain amount of rain and what  
38 will be occurring downstream. So we have to create this baseline first to determine if evacuation is  
39 needed.

40  
41 John Gwynne said this it the first system of its kind in New Mexico.

42

1 Councillor Levatino asked what is the time lapse between the time these stations collect the  
2 information and get it to the right people?

3

4 John Gwynne said to get a timeframe we have to have several storms so I would say 2-5 years to get  
5 a background history and understand what the information means.

6

7 Councillor Levatino asked how will the alerts go out?

8

9 John Gwynne said my staff and I get alarms on our cell phones. There is potential for it to go out  
10 to social media and other forms. If it is severe it will go out to MVRDA.

11

12 Mayor Miyagishima asked can residents in flood areas receive up to 20% off on their premiums?

13

14 Tony Trevino said the City is currently a number six rating so every citizen gets a 20% discount.

15

16 Mayor Pro-Tem Smith asked is vandalism ever an issue?

17

18 Tony Trevino said we will be putting fencing around them for protection.

19

21

22 Mayor Miyagishima called for the roll on the Motion to Approve Resolution No. 16-196 and it was  
23 Unanimously Approved. 7-0.

24

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27 (26) Council Bill No. 16-017; Ordinance No. 2776: An Ordinance to Repeal and Replace, in Its  
28 Entirety, Chapter 4 “Alarm Systems and Private Security Firms” of the Las Cruces Municipal  
29 Code (LCMC), 1997, as Amended.

30

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33 Mayor Pro-Tem Smith Moved to Approve Ordinance No. 2776 and Councillor Eakman Seconded  
34 the motion.

35

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37

38 Ted Sweetser, Fire Marshall gave an overhead presentation. He said there is a concern from the  
39 alarm industry over the confidentiality of the list of customers.

40

41 Rusty Babington, City Attorney said it will probably not be confidential. The limitations of the  
42 Inspection of Public Records is pretty narrow.

43

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1 Mayor Miyagishima asked if a resident wants to see a utility bill for another resident, can they do  
2 that?  
3  
4 Jorge Garcia said yes.  
5  
6 Ted Sweetser said the National Alarm Industry President has a model ordinance and he  
7 recommended that we copy that section of confidentiality and amend that into our ordinance.  
8  
9 Rusty Babington said it is a state statute. A solution might be putting an obligation on the alarm  
10 companies to ensure that they keep the records.  
11  
12 Ted Sweetser said MVRDA uses that information to send out fines and fees to the alarm users so we  
13 would need to capture that data.  
14  
15 Jason Rivera, Alarm Systems Administrator said I use that information to send out billing but I treat  
16 them as confidential.  
17  
18 Rusty Babington said if someone requested the information MVRDA would be in a difficult position  
19 as far as denying it.  
20  
21 Chief Travis Brown said another concern the alarm companies had was if they collected the money,  
22 then it would increase their revenue, which is why we would receive the list and MVRDA would  
23 send out the renewal notices.  
24  
25 Councillor Eakman asked what have you found out through the evaluation process about the effect  
26 of false alarms?  
27  
28 Ted Sweetser said false alarms have decreased by 3000.  
29  
30 Councillor Eakman asked how does that effect departmental readiness for real emergencies?  
31  
32 Ted Sweetser said that statistic is hard to track. As 99% of them are false, it does take away from  
33 the service we provide.  
34  
35 Chief Travis Brown said we determined it was a 20 minute time line that we spent handling a false  
36 alarm.  
37  
38 Councillor Levatino asked if someone requests the information, what exact information are they  
39 getting?  
40  
41 Jason Rivera said what I get is name, address, phone number and monitoring company.  
42

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- 1 Councillor Levatino asked is there specific information on what kind of monitoring system they  
2 have?  
3
- 4 Jason Rivera said no.  
5
- 6 Councillor Levatino asked can we limit the amount of information given out?  
7
- 8 Jason Rivera said when I came in I was told it was confidential. If someone does request it, we'll  
9 have to go through the records procedure that we have at MVRDA.  
10
- 11 Councillor Levatino said I think we should write into the ordinance that the only thing that can be  
12 given is the name.  
13
- 14 Mayor Miyagishima asked what is the minimum amount of information you need?  
15
- 16 Jason Rivera said name, alarm location, mailing address.  
17
- 18 Mayor Miyagishima asked do you technically not need the phone number?  
19
- 20 Jason Rivera said no.  
21
- 22 Rusty Babington said our ability to restrict information is limited so we could exclude the phone  
23 numbers if not needed but it will be difficult to exclude anything more than that.  
24
- 25 Councillor Levatino asked is this information only used to send out renewal notices?  
26
- 27 Jason Rivera said it mostly for that. I have had to rely on that list to find another contact number.  
28 Sometimes the alarm companies don't have the right numbers.  
29
- 30 Mayor Miyagishima said if we can get it passed as a state law then it will give us the right to not give  
31 that list out.  
32
- 33 Robert Garza said we could bring back an amendment at a subsequent date.  
34
- 35 Councillor Sorg asked were there fines for false alarms before this ordinance?  
36
- 37 Ted Sweetser said yes.  
38
- 39 Councillor Sorg said I make a Motion to Amend change all the language related to renewal of alarm  
40 permits. There was no second. Motion failed.  
41
- 42 Jason Rivera said the fees go toward the cost associated with running the program.  
43
- 44 Councillor Sorg said did you have to keep track before this ordinance?

1  
2 Jason Rivera said no. Codes would deal with these but there were too many for them to deal  
3 with and hence the ordinance.

4  
5 Chief Travis Brown said part of the reason we were seeing an increase in false alarms is because  
6 we didn't have an ordinance to manage it. So there are costs to manage this program and keep  
7 alarms reduced. The yearly registration was proposed in the model ordinance given to us by the  
8 organization that represents the alarm companies.

9  
10 Councillor Sorg asked how can we rectify the fact that a huge number of alarms aren't  
11 registered?

12  
13 Chief Travis Brown said the software will help us be more efficient in getting renewals out. We  
14 sent out informational flyers through the utility billing. We were having trouble getting  
15 information from the alarm companies so we now have a good list.

16  
17 Councillor Sorg asked do you get a list from all the alarm companies of who their customers are?  
18

19 Chief Travis Brown said yes.

20  
21 Councillor Sorg asked what's the consequence of not paying your permit?  
22

23 Chief Travis Brown said if we respond and you have an unregistered alarm there's a \$100 fine  
24 versus a registered alarm that does not get penalized under the third false alarm.  
25

26 Councillor Sorg asked what if they don't pay the \$100 fine?  
27

28 Chief Travis Brown said under the ordinance we can charge an additional penalty but it's not a  
29 criminal misdemeanor. We could go to a verified response, which means if the alarm goes off  
30 police and fire will not go out to that location until it is verified as a true alarm.  
31

13 Councillor Sorg Moved to Approve Mayor Miyagishima’s board appointment of Anthony Kessel
